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Head Master's Update



Dear Parents and Carers

A great deal has been accomplished since the start of this half-term across a wide range of school activities. Despite the autumnal temperatures, our athletes have been excelling, having won the Trafford Championships last week in every age group (Years 7-10). Additionally, our Under 14 XI cricket team defeated King's Macclesfield on Tuesday, securing a spot in the Cheshire County Final for the second consecutive year.

Our success extends beyond the sports field to academic enrichment activities. We received numerous Highly Commended, Gold, and Silver awards in the National Biology Challenge competition. In Modern Foreign Languages, several Year 8 students travelled to Lancaster University to represent our school in the Regional Finals of the Routes into Languages Translation Bee. This competition began with 2,450 Year 8 and Year 9 students from the North of England, and the best 48 (or 2%) advanced to this stage, translating as many sentences as possible in one minute. We are extremely proud to announce that Aryan D will represent our school in the National Finals in Cambridge next month.

At Monday evening's PFA meeting, a wide range of Departmental bids were discussed, and the majority were approved. These include frames, easels, and storage units for Art; five Apple computers for Music; and added security storage for the PE changing rooms. We are incredibly grateful to our amazing PFA and all the parents who support it. Your efforts are greatly appreciated and significantly benefit our school.

On Tuesday, I had the honour of speaking at Sir Graham Brady MP's farewell evening in London, organised by The Grammar School Heads Association. Sir Graham, an alumnus of AGSB, has been a great supporter of Grammar Schools and will be stepping down as MP for Altrincham and Sale West after the next election, following 27 years of service. Keeping with Politics, we eagerly anticipate the AGSB Election, which will take place from June 24th.

We are continuously striving to improve the education we offer our students. As we approach the end of the school year, we seek your feedback on our performance and how we can enhance what is important to you. On Wednesday, June 19th, you will receive a Parental Survey. Please do take the time to complete it. The results will be shared with Parents and Carers later this term.

This weekend marks our inaugural Duke of Edinburgh Bronze practice expedition. Additionally, we are hosting King William's College from the Isle of Man for a block cricket fixture.

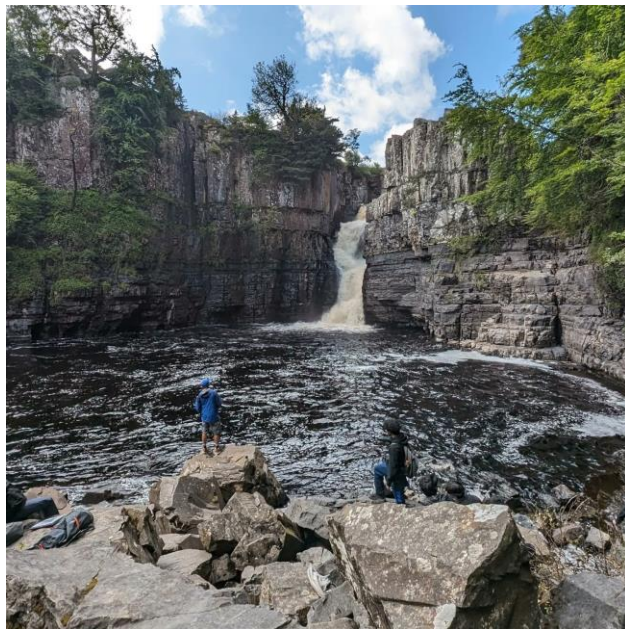

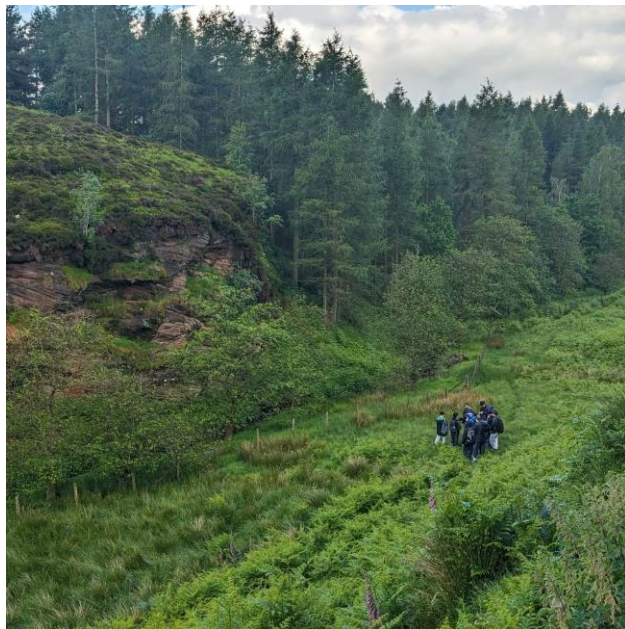

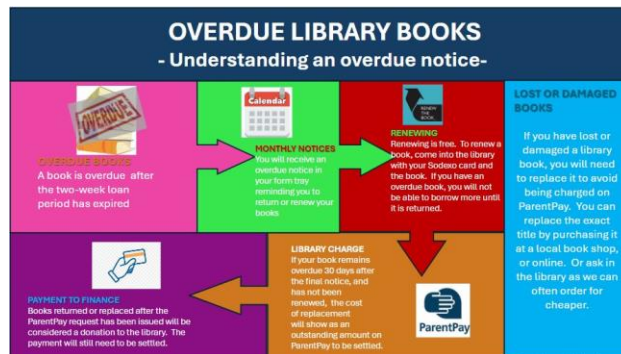

As the Summer Term is finally here, please could we ask that you check at home for outstanding library books. Our library shelves are feeling lost without them.

How to return and renew books

Returning books is easy - simply come to the library and hand them to our helpers who can process them for you. To issue books, we now have a card reader that uses your Sodexo card or sixth form ID lanyard (don't worry, this just reads your name and has no links to your account or money!)

You can also renew a book and extend the time you have to read it by coming to speak to a library helper on the desk. You will need your card and your book to do this.

Overdue books and Fines

Although we did not want to issue fines for overdue books, there is a substantial amount of stock missing. If a book is still overdue a half term after the due date and you have not renewed or returned it, we will have to assume it is lost. A fine will then be issued to cover the cost of replacement. We hope you understand this is so that everyone can enjoy the library and we can spend money on exciting, new things rather than replacing lost stock.

Geography A Level Fieldwork Trip 2024





On Wednesday, 5th June a group of A Level Geography students set off for their fieldwork projects to help consolidate and gain information for their NEA projects. We went to Blencathra in the Lake District for a three-day residential period for physical Geography and then two more days in Manchester the following week exploring the human side of the course.

We set off early on a relatively cold morning on the minibus raring to go. When we arrived, we went to the Easedale Valley in Grasmere to study and collect data on our glaciation topic. The group climbed up Roche moutonnées, studied striations in the u-shaped valley and eventually worked our way up the valley up to a Corrie glacier. Being able to see such a vital landform firsthand helped us all to see the perspective as to how large these features truly are... definitely a shocking change from the class projections!

The following morning, we went to the wettest place in Britain, the Borrowdale Valley. This region is described as a temperate rainforest, which came as a surprise for many of the students hearing that this exists only a few hours away in the North of England. However, surprisingly the weather was on our side. Somehow, we managed to go to the wettest part of the country without a single drop of rainfall on our

coats. Here we went to a coniferous and deciduous forest as well as spongy and wet peat bogs (which definitely managed to soak everyone's walking boots) to collect data on carbon sequestration and the carbon stored in these features.

On the final day of the residential we set out to do a study on the water/hydrological cycle. We went down the valley cliff to a river to collect data on how water quality changed downstream. We did fieldwork methods such as kick tests to determine the number of organisms in the river at different parts such as freshwater shrimp and even the odd blood sucking leech. Before we made our journey back, we went to see a final geographical feature on the way back called an esker. Unfortunately, the clouds erupted and we were completely soaked but managed to run back to the minibus just in time for our departure back to Altrincham. So, unpredictable weather, unforgettable memories and some great data for our NEA's manages to pretty much sum up the residential side of our trip.

As well as the residential, we spent two days earlier this week investigating the human side too, visiting different parts of the City to help improve our wider understanding of its economic and social structure. The first day of this fieldwork focused in on the Burgess Model, which maps out the relative distribution of social groups and housing types depending on their proximity from the City Centre. Being able to see this firsthand was an informative experience, as the changes were evident, even from just one or two stops on the tram, which could not have been replicated in the classroom.

On day two, we went to Ancoats, which has had some of the most successful and extensive regeneration in all Greater Manchester and is very relevant for our regeneration topic. Once there, we completed environmental quality surveys, seeing how the general living environment varies along different areas, using systematic sampling to measure at regular intervals, something which will certainly be mentioned within our NEA methodology section. One of my favourite parts of this day was interviewing locals, and finding out their opinions on their surrounding area, learning how much car park pricing would need to rise to change their method of transport, as well as general opinions on a potential clean air zone (ULEZ) in Manchester. Some of us had the benefit of interviewing tourists too, who had interesting insights on the relative cleanliness and environmental sustainability of Ancoats and Manchester in general, relative to their countries of residence.

In summary, the two fieldwork trips served as relevant accompaniments to our course, deepening our interest and knowledge of it, whilst learning about different areas of the city we live so close to, yet of which we know so little.

Thanks once again to Mr Bromley, Mr Williams and the Geography Department for making it possible.

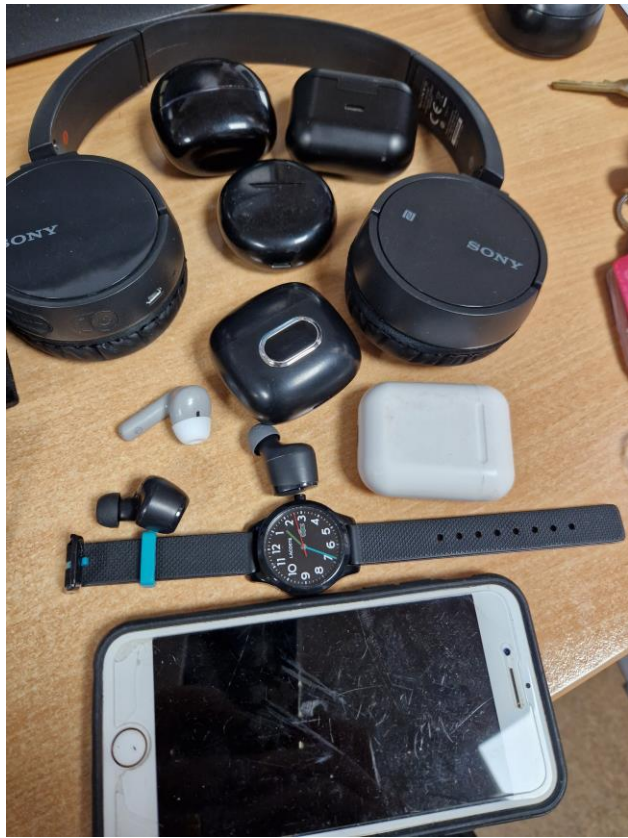
Lost Property

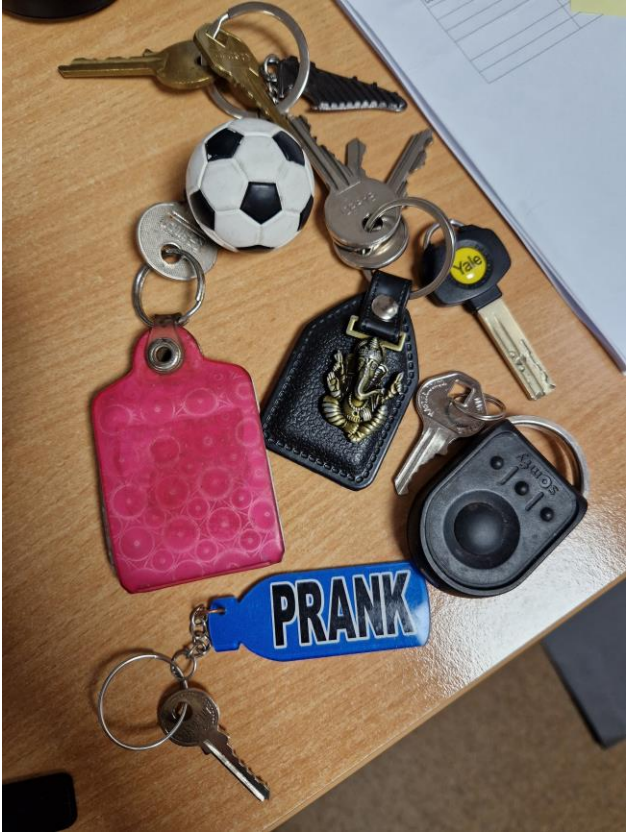

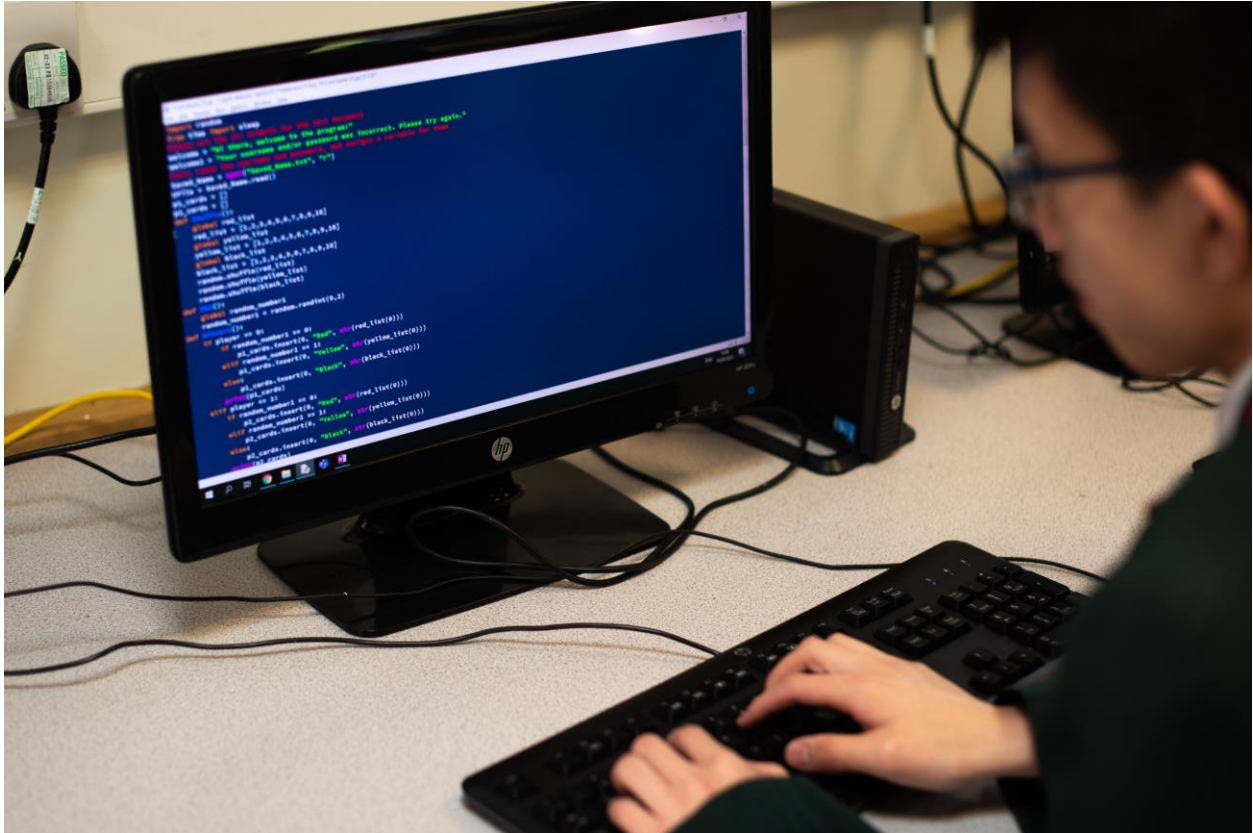
If your son has lost anything, he should first of all look in the bag room next to the Stamford Hall or speak to the staff on Reception.
